

1. The Bar of the Province of Quebec is authorized to admit Joseph Arthur Alphonse Pigeon to the practice of the legal profession, upon his undergoing the usual examination for admission to practice.

CHAP. 157

An Act to authorize the Bar of the Province of Quebec to admit Joseph Henry Dillon as one of its members, after examination

[Assented to 28th February, 1907]

WHEREAS Joseph Henry Dillon, student-at-law, of the city of Montreal, has, by his petition, represented :

That on the 8th July, 1904, he was admitted to the study of law and the certificate to that effect was registered on the same day.

That at the date of his admission to the study of law he was secretary of the road committee of the city of Montreal and at the same time following the office of the city attorney, Mr. L. J. Ethier K. C., though not regularly indentured to him, and continued so to follow said office until the 3rd May, 1906, when he was indentured to Mr. W. J. White, D. C. L., K. C.,

That he is following the law course of McGill University and will have completed the same in April, 1907.

That owing to the fact that he was not regularly indentured to Mr. L. J. Ethier, K. C., he will be unable to present himself for examination for admission to the practice of law until 1909 ;

That the General Council of the Bar of the Province of Quebec has approved the passing of an act to authorize the Bar of the Province of Quebec to admit him as one of its members, after he shall have passed the examination for admission to the practice of law, on condition that he obtain the degree required by law, and after the expiry of three years from the date of the registration of his certificate of admission to the study of law ;

Whereas the petitioner has prayed that an act be passed to that effect, and it is expedient to grant his prayer ;

Therefore, His Majesty, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly of Quebec, enacts as follows :

Bar of Province of Quebec may admit J. H. Dillon after examination, &c.

1. The Bar of the Province of Quebec is authorized to admit Joseph Henry Dillon as one of its members, after he shall have passed the examination for admission to the practice of law, on condition that he obtain the degree required by law, and after the expiry of three years from the date of registration of his certificate of admission to the study of law.

Coming into force.

2. This act shall come into force on the day of its sanction.

CHAP. 158

An Act to authorize the Bar of the Province of Quebec to admit Francis Henry Wilfrid Bovey among its members after examination.

[Assented to 28th February, 1907]

Preamble.

WHEREAS Francis Henry Wilfrid Bovey of the city of Montreal, barrister-at-law, hath by his petition represented :

That he is a Bachelor of Arts of McGill University, and that after graduating from McGill University he graduated in law from the university of Cambridge, in England, and was called to the English Bar, and that on the eighth day of July, 1904, he was admitted to the study of law in the Province of Quebec, and in the month of February of the same year was indentured to Alexander Falconer, Esq., K. C., advocate, of the city and district of Montreal ;

That never having served the term of clerkship required by law, he cannot until he has served such term obtain the diploma conferring the title of advocate ;

That he has prayed that the Bar of the Province of Quebec be authorized to admit him to the practice of an advocate ;

That the General Council of the Bar of the Province of Quebec has unanimously approved of the petitioner's application, and it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petitioner ;

Therefore, His Majesty, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly of Quebec, enacts as follows :

Bar of Province authorized to admit

1. The Bar of the Province of Quebec is hereby authorized to admit the said Francis Henry Wilfrid Bovey to the final
